Hastings—A driving snow-storm forced most of the fans to go home here Friday night, but the Lincoln Northeast Rockets stayed on to make the Hastings Tigers wish they had gone with the fans, blanking them for a third straight year, 45-0.

The near-blizzard conditions made a passing game all but impossible, so Art Bauer's club made all their 385 game yards on the ground, mostly on short grinding plays.

Hastings gave the fifth-rated Rockets an early scare, then handed the game over to the visitors, aiding the Lincoln club's efforts with f i v e costly fumbles and an interception.

The Tigers took the open-ing kick-off to their own 45 and quickly completed the first and only successful pass in the 50-mile-per-hour wind engroute to driving to the Northeast 23.

It was there that the first of their five fumbles handed the ball and the control of the game to the Capital City club. A booming punt with the wind backed the Rockets to their own goal line on the one, but the Rockets quickly showed the few spectators left why they are a highly-rated team. They used only ten plays, mostly utilizing the short break-aways of fullback Dave Mann. Allen Campbell took the ball over from 12 yards out to start the Miami Dumps scoring deluge.




